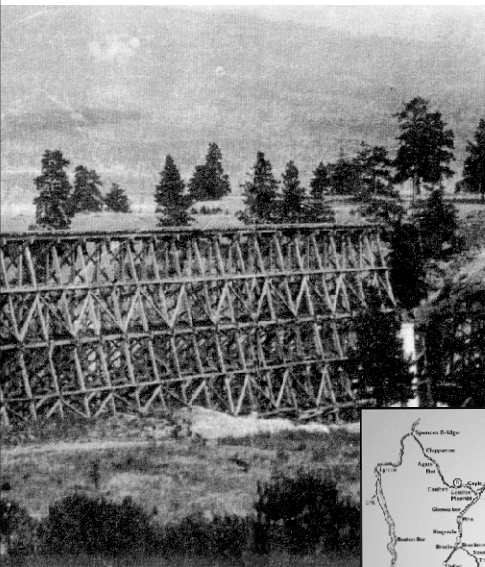

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD OF B.C.

The twenty-first annual session of the Presbyterian Synod of B.C. opened on Wednesday evening of this week in Chalmers Church, Vancouver. Rev. S. A. Wilson, pastor of St. Andrew's Church of that city, who is the retiring Moderator, conducted the opening exercises and preached the annual sermon. The Synod is constituted by ministerial and lay delegates each church being entitled to one of each.

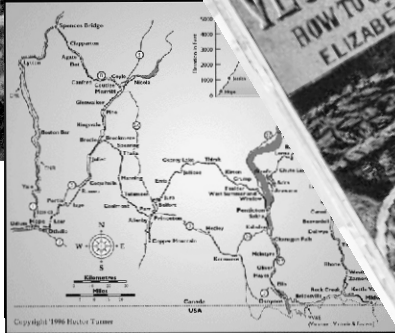
The biggest question discussed at this session was the proposed new mission. Mr. Wilson argued, much to the surprise of the audience, for the establishment of a mission in the north.

After three days of sessions, the Synod adjourned on Sunday morning. The report of the Synod will be published in the next issue of the Review, giving results of the meeting.
